Why Mary is Important?

When we think or speak of Mary, the Mother of God, it is always important to keep in mind that she is best understood in the context of her relationship with her son, Jesus. Said formally, Mariology is always constructed in the context of Christology. This is so because Christ is the redeemer and the sole source of salvation. Everything in creation came to be through him. Mary, because of her role, participates in the creative and redeeming action of God in a special way.

Mary's exceptional conception as sinless affords her the choice to live fully for God. She was not programmed to be good, but rather, Mary did not carry the deep fear of interference and resistance against God that exists in all other human beings. The rest of the human race has the grace and possibility to work with and overcome fear and anger, but we must work to limit our desire for control and instead surrender to God's grace. Connie Fortunato's Magnificat – Music Camp International

When the Iron Curtain fell, it revealed the plight of Romanian children warehoused in orphanages. The Ceausescu regime had insisted that women have as many as children as possible, to provide soldiers for a huge army. Many of these children were abandoned and given no real love and very little food. As a music educator and the former music director of Twin Lakes Church in Aptos, California, Connie knew that music could restore these children to wholeness. At first the Romanian government wanted her to teach music only to the children of the leadership. Connie insisted on teaching the orphans and she prevailed.

Fourteen years later, Connie's ministry, Music Camp International, has grown, yet it still flies by a wing and many prayers. Children in Ukraine and Romania are given musical instruments and a week's instruction in playing and singing. The results are miraculous as the sound of sacred music returns to cathedrals and the hearts of children. *See Music Camp, page 4*

Why do Catholics worship the Virgin Mary?

Dear Wondering,

This is a common misunderstanding of the devotion Catholics have for Mary the Mother of God. Catholics do not worship the Virgin Mary. Catholics, like other Christians, only worship the One God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. St. Mary is unique among all of the saints and for this reason we venerate (honor) her. According to Holy Scripture, Mary freely chose to be the mother of the savior and that is why we call her the Blessed Mother. Mary was God's choice to be the woman who would give birth to the truly divine and truly human man, Jesus of Nazareth.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (#969-972) tells us that Mary's importance is due to her relationship with God in the Divine work of salvation. Throughout her

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life Mary grappled with understanding God's promise in the midst of the life of her son Jesus. "Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart." (Luke 2:19) This is why Catholics and other ancient churches see Mary as the model of faith and charity. She is the first disciple and the model for all of the rest of us, since she is completely human. We see in her the model of the complete acceptance of God's love and grace. As the mother of God, Mary is also the mother of all the faithful. She is the mother of the Church.

Mary prayed with the men and women in the upper room after her son's ascension and received once again the Holy Spirit with them. Her example of faithful prayer in the midst of a mother's concern for her son, and her anguish and grief at his public torture and death, is a model for all of us dealing with pain, suffering, and grief in our lives. The resurrection and ascension of her son was also mystifying for this Jewish woman who believed the promise of God brought to her by the Angel Gabriel and who freely accepted the Word of God made flesh within her by the Holy Spirit.

Mary has not ceased her prayer. Caught up with all of the saints in the glory of God, Mary has a special place in God's heart. As her children, we know that we can come to her and she can help us by her love and prayers to walk with her son on His journey of salvation for all of us.

Three Words for Family Harmony from Pope Francis



On Wednesday May 13 at his General Audience in St Peter's square Pope Francis gave a short address on the three words that are key to family happiness

and well being. The three words in Spanish that are essential for healthy relationships are *permiso*, *gracias*, and *perdón*. In English they are phrases: "May I","Thank you!", and "Forgive Me".

Sometimes in our culture these expressions are seen as a sign of weakness as opposed to a true statement of our respect and affection in our intimate relationships. Respect for the dignity of our spouses, children and other family members is central to living our faith. Without this underlying bedrock respect and affection, these key relationships can rupture and damage everyone in the process.

Conflicts and disagreements — even arguments — are part of any honest relationship, but Pope Francis encourages us to be reconciled with each other by the end of the day whenever possible.

Politeness, courtesy, and respect are important in our speech, and have to be accompanied by changed behavior. As St. Ignatius Loyola says, "Love is shown more in deeds than in words." These three expressions are deeds that open the door to improved behavior, mutual acceptance and loving response to challenges in happy families.



Hispanic-Mozarabic Rite from Spain Celebrated

On May 16, 2015 the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass was celebrated at St. Peter's Basilica according to the Hispanic-Mozarabic Rite for only the 4th time in history. Developed before the Moorish

conquest of Spain, the Mozarabic rite is as ancient as the memory of Christianity in Spain.

As the kings of northern Spain fought their way south during the Reconquista (Reconquest), they brought with them the liturgical books of the Roman Rite. When they arrived in Toledo, they found Catholics who had maintained their faith and liturgy during the 400 years of Islamic rule. While living under Islamic rule these Catholics had learned Arabic and adopted new fashions of clothing, but never lost their identity. They were dubbed, "Mixto-Arabs" or Mozárabes and the rich faith and liturgy that sustained them against persecutions and trials


Jesse Manibusan, singer, songwriter, entertainer, and liturgical musician, has posted a new promotional music video, "The Life You Live".

As Music Camp International's website explains,



She was born totally honest and prepared to grow. She chose to say "yes" over and over to these qualities, even when they brought suffering.

Mary was and is "full of grace." In the spiritual relationship which she has with her son and the whole of creation, Christ's grace pours through her as the first disciple to all of humanity. Mary mothers us (protects and strengthens us) if we let her. Catholicism understands all of humanity, living and dead, to be in spiritual solidarity, a mystical body. Because of this solidarity or communion, Mary can help us to have a readiness to commitment, trust even in unbearable loss, and unimaginable joy when we are united to her son.
